Pornography in Dumfries and Galloway

As part of his Honours Year study, and in conjunction with D&G Sexual Health Week 2018, a Glasgow University Student has completed a project with Sexual Health D&G to look into the effects that pornography use is having on service users across the region.



Based on feedback from staff attending a multi-agency event, survey monkey responses and individual interviews the final report of this projects states that:

- * There is a clear issue in Dumfries and Galloway with pornography use and this is affecting service users in a range of differing ways;
- * There is an evident need for more training for service providers
- * More resources are required to raise awareness of the effects of pornography use.

The report makes several recommendations including enhancing the Sexual Health D&G website, developing a public awareness campaign utilising various mediums and materials and developing training opportunities and workshops on the topic.

New Vasectomy Service at Sexual Health D&G

Vasectomy under local anaesthetic (LA) is **now available at Sexual Health D&G** based in Dumfries. This will bring NHS D&G into line with a number of other Health Boards in Scotland where LA vasectomies are done **in the community** setting. Men suitable for vasectomy under LA should be **referred** to Sexual Health D&G using <u>SCI Gateway</u>. Those who **do not fulfil the criteria** (see exclusions stated below) should still be referred to urology.

The exclusion criteria are:

- * Men with a BMI greater than or equal to 35
- * Men with artificial heart valves, stents, pacemakers, blood vessel grafts, shunts or a foreign body (including joint replacements)
- * Men on a blood thinning drug for example warfarin, aspirin, clopidogrel, riveroxaban or dabigatran
- * Men not willing to consider the procedure under local anaesthetic/

Sexual Health D&G also **accept referrals directly** from men. Men can **phone 0345 702 3687** and ask for a vasectomy counselling appointment in the first instance. If men self refer and have any of the exclusion criteria Sexual Health will refer the patient to Urology.



Scotland's first clinic for victims of sexual violence is now open! The service offers cervical screening (smear tests) for people who have experienced rape or sexual violence and are due or overdue for their test.

Syphilis patient calls for public debate as cases rise

Rates of syphilis have risen to their **highest levels in England** and **Scotland in nearly 70 years.** It can be spread more easily than other sexually transmitted infections and those infected can carry it without having any symptoms. Watch Gavin's Story (not his real name) **here:**



Man has 'world's worst' super-gonorrhoea

He had a regular partner in the UK, but picked up the super bug after a sexual encounter with a woman in South East Asia. Public Health England says it is the first time the infection cannot be cured with first choice antibiotics.

Protecting and improving the nation's health

Towards elimination of HIV transmission, AIDS and HIV-related deaths in the UK

Public Health England have published the latest findings and recommendations on the elimination of HIV transmissions and HIV-related deaths in the UK. The report features data from across the UK and shows the following relevant findings for Scotland:

- 43% of HIV diagnoses were classified as late in Scotland. The lowest rates of late diagnoses were observed in London (36%)
- New HIV diagnoses in gay and bisexual men have declined, particularly in London. Between 2015 2016, diagnoses in Scotland decreased from 131 to 90 (30%).

Hannah Witton: 'Why doesn't anyone wear condoms on TV?'

When was the last time you saw someone wear a condom on TV? Or discuss contraception?

A 2017 study by the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, which analysed programmes such as Orange is the New Black, True Blood, House of Cards and Gossip Girl, found that only 0.02% of sex scenes on television feature contraception.

Almost half of sexually active young people do not use a condom when sleeping with someone for the first time, and more than one-third of young people think carrying protection is a sign someone is promiscuous, a survey has found.


One in 10 sexually active 16 to 24-year-olds, the age group that accounted for 59% of chlamydia and gonorrhoea diagnoses in England last year, said they had never used a condom, prompting calls from the Royal College of GPs for investment in sexual and reproductive health services.

The World Health Organisation (WHO) reports that the numbers of people affected by STIs are staggering. More than 30 different bacteria, viruses, and parasites lead to over 1 million sexually transmitted infections each day. Annually, there are an estimated 131 million chlamydia infections, 78 million gonorrhea infections, 5.6 million syphilis infections and 143 million trichomoniasis infections. These infections can, at present, be treated with existing antibiotic regimens. Antimicrobial resistance, however, is a growing threat, particularly for gonorrhea and Mycoplasma genitalium The most prevalent viral STIs are genital herpes simplex virus infection (affecting an estimated 500 million people worldwide) and human papillomavirus (HPV) infection (affecting 290 million women and leading to some 500,000 cases of cervical cancer annually).

Digital Romance

A <u>report published by Brook and NCA's CEOP command</u> reveals how digital technology fundamentally shapes the ways in which young people relate to one another in the arena of romance, sex and relationships. The research highlighted both the positives and the negatives of using technology which furthers our understanding of the challenges young people face as well as provides insights to improve education for young people.



Significantly more gay (58%) and bisexual (52%) young people had asked someone out online compared to those who were heterosexual (38%)

This research report from **Relationship Scotland** is the sixth and final in a series presenting findings from their landmark '**The Way We Are Now**' survey of over 5,000 people across the UK, providing a **unique window** into the state of our couple and sexual relationships, our families, our relationships at work, and our social relationships at work, and our social relationships and how they impact upon our relationship quality and our well be in g.

A **new resource** aimed at educating young people on **normal female anatomy** – specifically **vulva appearance** – has been launched by the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (RCOG) and the British Society for Paediatric and Adolescent Gynaecology (BritsPAG).

Brook has been supporting BritsPAG to develop '<u>So</u> what is a vulva anyway?' in response to an increasing number of girls and women with cosmetic genital concerns requesting surgery despite having normal anatomy.

According to NHS figures, in 2015-16 more than 200 girls under 18 had labiaplasty and more than 150 of the girls were under 15. These numbers do not include girls and young women having the procedure privately. Experts say these operations do not have a medical justification. The booklet can be downloaded here:

The short film **Not for nice women: contraception before and after 1967** was created by Brook Policy Manager Lisa Hallgarten and colleagues from University College London, Dr Jayne Kavanagh and Dr Angela Poulter, to mark the passing of the Family Planning Act 1967. The documentary demonstrates how this change came about and the vital role played by pioneering women such as Helen Brook. **It depicts the stories of real women as well as health professionals, and how societies' attitudes towards women's sexuality affected their access to contraception.** Watch the film here:

Wales bans the intimate piercing of under 18s

Wales has become the first country in the UK to introduce a nationwide ban on the intimate piercing of under 18s. The new law, which came into force on 1 February, makes it an offence for piercing practitioners to arrange and/or carry out an intimate piercing on those under 18. The aim of the new law is to protect children and young people from the potential health harms which can be caused by an intimate piercing.

A study in England found that amongst individuals aged 16-24 complications were reported with around a third of all body piercings. The same study found a higher incidence of complications in connection with certain types of body piercings, including intimate piercings. Problems were most likely to be reported in the case of tongue piercing (50%), followed by piercings of the genitals (45%) and the nipples (38%). Read more here:

Good Sex project

Building evidence-based practice in young people's sexual health.

The 'good sex' project involved young people, sexual health professionals, researchers and artists. The project aimed to bring them together to make films, training materials and educational resources on sexual pleasure and how to 'be sex positive'. The 'good sex' project is based on a PhD research project funded by Brook and The Open University. Over four years the researcher, Ester McGeeney, collected survey, interview and focus group data from young people in London to find out more about how and what they understand about 'good sex' and 'sexual pleasure'. One in eight trans employees (12 per cent) have been physically attacked by a colleague or customer in the last year.

Half of trans people (51 per cent) have hidden their identity at work for fear of discrimination.

A quarter of trans people (25 per cent) have experienced homelessness.

Almost half (48 per cent) of trans people don't feel comfortable using public toilets through fear of discrimination or harassment.

Almost one-quarter of all registered sex offenders carried out online child sexual abuse, according to a snapshot taken by Police Scotland. Police Scotland have launched a campaign 'Not my Friend'. The social media messages and online advertising posters are designed to encourage children into a healthy skepticism when communicating online. The campaign is also focused at perpetrators, warning them of the consequences they face as a result of committing online child sexual abuse offences. Read more here:

The Centre of Expertise on Child Sexual Abuse (CSA) recognises that in order to be successful in preventing child sexual abuse from happening, and protecting children who are experiencing abuse, we must develop a better understanding of perpetrators and perpetration.

Six exploratory studies have been carried out to increase our understanding of **CSE perpetration and perpetrators**. The studies vary in their approach including: identifying findings from research to date, undertaking interviews with experts and in some cases, case file analysis, new empirical evidence on the characteristics and perspectives of individuals who sexually exploit young people. #WholsSam: Online contact and reporting to CEOP

With the increased threat of offenders using online live streaming platforms there is a to educate children about the need associated risks. CEOP want to help parents and carers protect their children from online offenders like Sam, the fictional narrator of the animation, who targets children online and quickly builds trust with them. The short animation highlights the importance parents and carers talking openly with their children about being safe online, about healthy relationships and encouraging them to speak out if anything happens online that worries them or doesn't feel right. 
