'LET'S TALK ABOUT SEX - SHADES OF PLEASURE' DUMFRIES & GALLOWAY'S SEXUAL HEALTH WEEK 21st -27TH JANUARY 2013

People have sex for many reasons: love and affection, conformity, recognition, power, stress reduction, reproduction, as part of a relationship or to earn a living. Sex and sexuality are fundamental to most people at some point in their lives. It is important that people can access sexual health services, information and education to make informed choices about their sexual health and wellbeing.

The aspect of pleasure is rarely talked about and does not feature highly in sexual health promotion, however, sexual pleasure is a highly significant, if not primary, motivating factor for sexual behaviour. Sexual pleasure can be different for people, what is pleasurable for one person may not be for another person and sexual pleasure can change over time. It encompasses feelings, consent, values and attitudes and can be affected by a of variety reasons such as physical, emotional, social, cultural, religious and external factors. Therefore, this year Sexual Health D&G annual awareness week 'Let's talk about sex' is focusing on 'shades of pleasure.'

Aim

To encourage people to talk openly about sex and sexual pleasure

to raise awareness of people's rights to sexual pleasure to raise awareness of sources of help and support

to highlight that what might be pleasurable for one party may not be for another

WE ALL MAKE MISTAKES WITH ALCOHOL

Dumfries and Galloway Constabulary and Dumfries and Galloway Licensing Boards in conjunction with Dumfries and Galloway Alcohol and Drug Partnership are running a Safer Drinking Campaign between the 7th and 31st December 2012.

The purpose of the campaign is to raise public awareness about the potential short term consequences arising out of the overindulgence in potent shot type alcoholic drinks. During the campaign staff within participating on-sales licensed premises throughout the Region will wear specifically designed t-shirts which will endorse and promote the campaign

The front of the t-shirts will show an image of filled shot glass with a "pneumonic" shots message which has deliberate spelling mistakes. It is hoped that this will engender discussion about the highlighted risks amongst the target audience who are, in the main, aged between 18 to 40. The poster will also bear the strapline "we all make mistakes with alcohol".

The rear of the t-shirt will show a message from the Domestic Abuse and Violence Against Women Partnership (DAVAP) depicting the national White Ribbon Campaign which is a campaign promoting males against domestic violence



Young people's sexual health charity Brook has a launched an online sexual behaviors traffic light tool for all professionals working with young people.

The tool uses a 'traffic light' system of red, amber and green to provide a simple guide to distinguishing between healthy and harmful behaviors. The tool is an aid to decision making and can help professionals in their work to support young people to stay safe and healthy and ensure that all agencies are working to the same criteria.

The resource was developed by Brook and funded by the Department for Education. For the first time it provides a common tool that everyone working with young people can use to assess and respond to behaviors. Key organizations and groups were involved in the project from the beginning and a wide range of professionals working with young people, as well as parents and young people themselves were consulted on its development.


"I thought I was the only one. The only one in the world" The Office of the Children's Commissioner's Inquity into Child Sexual Exploitation in Gangs and Groups INTERIM REPORT November 3842 Arthon: Superior Scommissioner Commissioner C

CHILD SEXUAL EXPLOITATION

The recent interim report 'I thought I was the only one. The only one in the world' published in November 2012 by the Office of Children's Commissioners (OCC) has highlighted the scale of child sexual exploitation in England. Based on evidence submitted to the 'Child Sexual Exploitation in Groups and Gangs' (CSEGG) between April 2010 – March 2011 16,500 children were identified as being at risk of child sexual exploitation. Other evidence submitted to CSEGG during August 2010 to October 2011 confirmed 2,409 'victims' of child sexual exploitation in gangs or groups. The figure is thought to be higher because of unseen cases not reported or recorded. There are no figures available for Scotland? The full report can be read here

'WE CAN STOP IT' CAMPAIGN

A Scotland-wide police campaign led by the Association of Chief Police Officers (ACPOS) has been designed to educate and change attitudes towards rape and sexual assaults was launched in Edinburgh on 13th September 2012. The Sexual Offences (Scotland) Act 2009 reformed previous legislation for sexual offences and created a range of new offences relating to sex without consent. Crimes that previously



haven't been focused on, such as sex when a victim is asleep or unconscious, sex without consent through inebriation, and male rape all fall under this.

With the tagline "We can stop it", the campaign uses a series of strong, thought-provoking statements from young men aged 18 - 27 year olds acting as positive role models. It asks young men to consider their own behaviour and the role they can play in preventing rape.



A Restaurant with a Mission: Cabbages and Condoms, Bangkok

Mechai Viravaidya is the founder of Thailand's Population and Community Development Association or PDA and contended that "birth control should be as accessible and as easy to buy as vegetables in the market!" Hence the name "Cabbages & Condoms." Mechai's communications strategy is to deploy jokes and catchy visuals to overcome resistance, by locals and tourists alike, to issues like sex, family planning, and HIV/AIDS. Mechai is known by locals as "Khun" Mechai, or the Condom King. Formerly a well-known government official, he's been directing PDA's sex education programs so long that condoms in Bangkok have become widely called "mechais."

The first Cabbages & Condoms restaurant was set up in 1984 in Bangkok's Sukhumvit area. They are now several restaurants across Thailand and the first condom and cabbage restaurant has just opened in Bicester Oxford, England. The restaurants have posters on the walls displaying prophylactics from around the world. Neat rows of multicoloured condoms appear under the glass tops of dining tables. Condoms decorate lamps and flower vases in rest rooms. Bowls of "condom-mints" are presented as party favours. A sign assures customers that "our food is guaranteed not to cause pregnancy." All the profits go into sex education and AIDS prevention programmes in Thailand. It also serves very good Thai food and is rated highly on Trip Advisor.



Domestic Abuse Against Women Partnership (DAWP) 16 days of activism




As part of 16 days of activism DAWP showed the film' Desert Flower' to highlight awareness of female genital mutilation. This was the true story of Waris Dirie who was born into a nomad family living in the Somali desert near the border to Ethiopia in 1965. At the tender age of five, she was forced to undergo the inhuman procedure of female genital mutilation. At the age of 13, after being forced to marry a man who was old enough to be her grandfather Waris made a harrowing escape

from her homeland and ended up in London. Initially she found employment as a housemaid and later at a McDonald's. At the age of 18 she was discovered by one of Britain's leading fashion photographers, Terence Donovan, who thought she would be the perfect model and she quickly became an international celebrity and appeared in James Bond -'The Living Daylights' In 1996 the Secretary-General of the United Nations, Kofi Annan, appointed Waris Dirie a UN Special Ambassador for the elimination of Female Genital Mutilation. She has traveled the world extensively for the UN, participated in numerous conferences on the subject, met with national leaders, Nobel Prize-winners, international stars, gaining support for this important issue as well as generating large donations for the UN.

This horrible tradition is still practiced in many countries around the world today despite it being recognized internationally as a violation of the human rights of girls and women. According to records kept by the United Nations more than 8000 girls become victims of this heinous crime every day. It is estimated that 500,00 girls and women are living in Europe with the lifetime consequences of female genital mutilation.


