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Welcome

Welcome to issue 3 of c4u newsletter. Everyone will be busy getting organised for Christmas and New Year. It is hard to believe we will soon be saying farewell to another year. Best wishes to you all for the festive season.



A recent survey by TV Company MTV Networks UK to mark World Aids Day revealed some worrying evidence from those who took part in the survey.

75% women aged 16-30yrs olds did not insist on their partner using a condom 64% of men do not always use a condom

1 in 4 women and men thought that the Pill and other contraceptives' would protect them from ${\sf STIs}$

33% in the 22-25 year olds have had unsafe sex more than 20 times. 66% never ask a new partner about their sexual history and 50% of those said 'it never crossed their minds'

Although 1 in 5 admitted that they were taking a risk with their sexual health they were often too embarrassed or unconcerned to protect themselves from STIs by using a condom.

Schools and TV were cited as the most common places to obtain information. This suggests that prevention and information can play a major part in helping to reducing the high incidence of STIs. All of us working in sexual health must continue to emphasise to young people the importance to themselves and others in using condoms correctly and consistently to reduce their risk from acquiring an STI.

Speakeasy Project

Research has shown that sex and relationships education can raise the age young people first try out sexual activity, cut the rate of teenage pregnancies and abortion, and lower the rate of sexually transmitted infections (STIs). Most young people want to hear the facts from their parents or carers and be able to talk with them about body changes, feelings and boyfriends/girlfriends, yet many parents and carers feel embarrassed or are not sure what to say.

Speakeasy will help you feel more confident talking to your children about sex, relationships and growing up. It's a Family Planning Association (FPA) course for mums, dads and carers of children of all ages. It's a fun and relaxed and is delivered over 8 weekly sessions. In addition the Speakeasy course is accredited by the Open College Network so you have the option to gain an award which could help you go onto further training or employment.



'Big World' recently took place at the Victoria Halls in Annan This involved 6th year pupils from 9 secondary schools being taken on a virtual night out which was acted out by drama students from George Street School of Art. Drama, short lectures and workshops were given on issues such as LGBT, drugs, alcohol, sex, safe driving, knife crime and fire safety. It is an innovative way to get important messages across to young people. 419 people attended and the event has evaluated well. Planning for next years event will commence in Jan 08
